News Report – August 2023

Welcome to the October update

It feels very surreal to be writing the October update and thinking about autumn, when at the time of writing (early September) we are experiencing a very hot and humid Indian Summer - all the windows are open and I am gently trying to encourage the wasps and other insects to stay outside the office! By the time you read this we may well be back to cooler more typically autumnal weather, but if not please do remember to stay hydrated!

Wildflower meadows/verges

Speaking of insects, following the Restoring Shropshire's Verges Project presentation at the June Council meeting, a number



of interested volunteers mobilised and are already working hard on plans for a couple of wildflower verges in Clive.

Wildflower verges are a fantastic way of restoring wildlife habitats, and creating wildlife corridors for mammals like dormice. They also provide a vital food source for pollinators (who we rely on for our own food production), and also helps Shropshire Council save money on verge cutting costs. They are also beautiful to look at!

At the July Council meeting volunteers asked the Parish Council for a small budget to help towards equipment and native wildflower seeds and this was readily agreed. The Parish Council is going to has representatives on the volunteer group and will help as much as it can with this important project.

New faces on the Parish Council

The Parish Council is thrilled that two new members were co-opted onto the Parish Council at the July meeting. Your new Councillors are Sharon Cunliffe (Mattu) and Paul Hewitt. They both bring a range of valuable skills and backgrounds which will complement the skillset of the existing Council members, and we are looking forward to working together to help the local community.

Local Plan Review update

At the time of writing (early-Sept) there has not been much progress on the Local Plan examination process. This is partly due to the news of potential legal action against Shropshire Council, which some of you may have seen in the local news. We are keeping an eye on the examination webpage for updates, but this situation will undoubtedly cause further delays in the examination process.

At this point in time we don't know exactly what kind of impact this will have on the Stage 2 hearings, which were originally expected to be taking place this autumn. It is the Stage 2 hearings that are supposed to deal with specific housing figures and site allocations in settlements across the county, including Clive. I'm sorry that we don't have anything more concrete right now, but hopefully there will be further updates soon.

Traffic in Clive

Stumbling blocks for Wem Road VAS sign

As a further update from the last newsletter, unfortunately despite the Council's best efforts, the PCC (Police and Crime Commissioner) is to increase on the funding limit for individual road safety project grants. This means the maximum the police will be able to offer in grantng will still not be enough for the Parish Council to purchase its preferred model for the 3rd VAS sign that we hoped to install on Wem Road.

Another potential stumbling block is that Shropshire Council Highways are currently putting together new guidance on the processes for VAS signs installed. I (your Clerk) took part in a working group discussion in August to review the first draft of the VAS guidance document, which was very helpful and productive. There is understandably a need to ensure the road network does not become cluttered with signs that may not always be effective, however there were some concerns from myself and fellow clerks in the working group that the proposed process may make it a lot harder for small rural councils to have a VAS sign installed (even if they do have the necessary funds). There are still changes to be factored into the guidance, but the Parish Council may need to look into other ways of reducing speeding on Wem Road if a VAS sign is no longer an option.

Latest VAS data

Whilst we try to sort out a VAS sign we are continuing to ask the local police for help with speed enforcement in the parish, and have shared

the most recent speed data with them. Many thanks to Cllr Ian Donoghue for downloading and analysing the data, and putting together the useful summary below.

The data itself can be found on the Parish Council website (check the "Speed Concerns" page under the "Policing in Clive" header), but here are the headlines:

- 1. Speeding is more prevalent on Quarry view over 20% of all vehicles are in excess of 35mph. For Station road, this figure is about 7% but still represents more than 1 in 20 vehicles.
- 2. For Station Road, the overall vehicle count has dropped from 12124 to 9681. This doesn't represent a like-for-like period but it does show the morning peak (0800-0900) exceeds the afternoon peak (1500-1600) suggesting an eastbound flow through the village in the mornings.
- 3. The Quarry View sign recorded 29164 vehicles in the second half of 2022 rising to 44089 for the first 6 months of 2023. This VAS was offline for a significant period last year so this is not likely to reflect accurate numbers. However, the afternoon peaks exceed the morning peaks suggesting the flow of traffic is westbound through the village in the afternoons.
- 4. In targeting speeders, we have suggested to the police that AM rush-hour traffic eastbound (Station Rd) and PM rush-hour traffic westbound (Quarry View) should be the priority for enforcement. Of these, Quarry View comprises the higher proportion of excessive speed counts.

Community Speed watch

We're always in need of more volunteers for the Community Speed Watch, so please do contact the coordinator Matt Alexander (mattalexander_@hotmail.com) or the Clerk if you're interested. It's a good opportunity to get outside, catch up with neighbours, and do your bit to make Clive safer for everyone!

Public transport

We are continuing to lobby Arriva about the changes to the 511 bus service – our Freedom of Information requests revealed that there were no complaints about punctuality on the service, which was the original justification given for reducing the service. We have been keeping North Shropshire MP Helen Morgan in the loop about the situation and we had a very nice email from her office congratulating us on our hard work on

this matter. We understand Helen Morgan will be holding a roundtable event with bus operators regarding the importance of rural services so will continue to keep her updated.

Severn Trent road closure complaints

Despite the Parish Council proactively contacting Severn Trent regarding the planned works on 13th August, it was very disappointing to hear that once again, no one removed the traffic cones, road closures signs and other traffic management equipment once the work was complete. After reporting this to Shropshire Council and Severn Trent it was eventually sorted out, but once again the failure to remove traffic management equipment caused unnecessary confusion and disruption to motorists and buses attempting to get to Clive. This will be on the agenda again in September, so by the time you read this there may well be more updates.

The Parish Council's Environment Committee works to encourage and help coordinate activities that protect and enhance the local area, for the benefit of parishioners, visitors and the natural flora and fauna. Our recent work has centred around two specific projects.

RSVP

The RSVP (Restoring Shropshire's Verges Project) got fully underway this spring and summer. Hopefully you noticed the verges either side of the road by the cricket club entrance were cleared of the ground elder and nettles that prevented almost anything else growing. Hard going, taking up to an hour to clear every metre of ground, but it was worth it.

Beneath the choking weeds, the soil was good (it's a bit of a myth that wild flowers thrive in poor soil, they just tend to have little competition there). It was a bonus to expose the stone walls on either side and also a pleasant surprise to find very little litter had accumulated over the years.

The sites were left bare for a few weeks so they could be revisited and re-weeded. Anyone with ground elder in their garden knows how persistent it is. My philosophy is that you have to keep battling against it, even if the war can never be won! After a few sessions, the ground was clean enough for seedlings sown earlier in spring to be plugged in — mainly foxglove, field scabious and lady's smock initially, then poppies, cornflowers and ox-eye daisies.

What hadn't been expected was that the seedlings were planted just as we went into a long hot and dry spell in May and June. Daily watering was essential and most evenings found me trudging along the lane laden with watering cans, with much appreciated support from others while I was away. I was wrong to think the cricket club might have an outside water source!

The seedlings seemed to thrive eventually and we did get some flowering, although it was always expected that next spring and summer should see more colour. The weeds returned of course, especially nettles. While clearing these, it was really encouraging to discover some species present that hadn't been planted – shining crane's bill, greater celandine, annual toadflax, fool's parsley, red shank, ground ivy, red goosefoot and even some lobelia and (according to my identifier) Peruvian zinnia somehow crept in! Perhaps the seeds of the wild species had lain dormant until the ground was disturbed.

In August we had three Royal Navy helicopter pilots at the end of their training volunteer for a morning, and they quickly cleared another few metres of weeds on either side of the road. That's saved us a lot of work so many thanks to RAF Shawbury for their services.

The newly cleared stretch has been left again for re-weeding but we have several trays of varied seedlings to plant there in October. Thanks to former councillor Helen Massy's dad for growing those.

This autumn we'll also sow some seed directly into the verges so they can over-winter (vernalisation). It'll be interesting to see how they develop - we're far from being experts but it's fun to learn as we go!

The project is a continuous one. The restored verges need maintenance and we want to extend the wild flowers wherever we can. At the moment it makes sense to continue along the lane where we've begun but we'll also be adding wild flowers near the woodland school.

No doubt there are plenty more sites that could be enhanced with splashes of spring and summer colour, whilst providing valuable food and habitat for wildlife diversity. They just need to be close to a water supply – or willing volunteers!

Wetlands

Another project that we're hoping to embark on in the coming months is the creation of a wetland area in Corbet Wood, in conjunction with Shropshire Council.

Wetlands and water courses greatly enhance biodiversity and this is something generally lacking in Grinshill. Those who use the hill will know from muddy experience that it has some areas that rarely dry out, and we've identified a site close to the old quarries that seems particularly suitable. It's not intended that a deep pond will be created, rather it will be an area of shallow water and marshy ground.

The idea is for a camber to be built onto the path so that it drains naturally to the sides, rather than settling as a mess of cloying mud for most of the year. To the side of the path the land is already quite marshy and it's hoped the natural drainage into this area would enable it to remain a viable wetland all year round. As we inspected the possible site with Mike Simms and Simon Brown of Shropshire Council in June, a dragonfly flew amongst us — it seemed a sign that we'd found the right place!

A final decision on the location has still to be made. The chosen site will be tested for water retention before being scraped and lined. Some tree work will be needed to avoid too much water being taken and the area being choked with leaves.

Hopefully before long we'll have a small area on the hill with an abundance of plants and wildlife that we wouldn't otherwise see.

Sansaw Estate Update September 2023

As summer draws to a close and we look forward to the fruits, colours and cooler mornings that Autumn heralds. It is a time for more maintenance, milking and (still a bit more) mowing but also a time for planning and reviewing.

Sansaw Estate, like the Forth Road Bridge always requires maintenance whether it is blocked drains, a house refurbishment or just branches that need removing from a dangerous roadside tree. There is never a dull moment and one day is never the same as the next.

Over the past three months we have completed another two full house refurbishments at Alderton Hall and 10a Shrewsbury Road in Hadnall. We have spent the summer catching up on the perennial job card list as well as re-roofing 4 and painting 20 houses. The multi skilled maintenance team under the watchful eye of Gregg Davies are always on hand, endeavouring to be ahead of the next issue!

On the farm front we have enjoyed an unlikely season of plentiful grass and have filled the winter silage clamps, which will see us through well into 2024. The cows have performed fantastically and despite a relatively poor milk price we have achieved our best technical performance ever. As always credit to Bref Daly and his mighty team.

Having been back at Sansaw for 18 years I cannot help but notice how much more rubbish maligns the countryside and our roads - it brings me out in a fiendish rage. What is equally infuriating is dog walkers who are happy to clear up there dog poo only to leave their dog poo bags on a gate post or hanging in a tree or bush - even on the top of Grinshill Hill. We implore all dog walkers to take poo bags home with you so we can all enjoy our beautiful countryside!

Our vision is and always has been to leave the Estate in better condition than when we took it on, we are merely custodians and we continue to work tirelessly to improve our built and natural environment through strong stewardship and a genuine love for the countryside.

As always there are a number of other activities happening on the Estate - in June we hosted Open Farm Sunday and the first two weekends in September saw 300 horses gallop, in a mainly controlled manner, over Sansaw's green and pleasant pastures. These were in aid of the HAJ Memorial Trust that supplies AED's to communities across Shropshire and the West Midlands.

THE GARDNER FAMILY OF SANSAW HALL.


Few Clive families can equal the 260-year association of the ancient branch of the Gardner family, successful Drapers who were closely linked to our mother church of St Mary's in Shrewsbury. Their early ancestors are commemorated here, whilst others chose to be laid to rest in the Gardner Vault of Clive Church. John Gardner [1595-1628], 12th in line of this ancient family, purchased Sansaw Hall in 1622 from Richard Russell and initially the Estate was passed down the Gardner line: through Thomas [1617-1667], John [1660-1699], Thomas [1680-1763] and John [1745-1801]. The last- named carried out extensive alterations to the mansion in 1774 immediately prior to his marriage the following year to Emma Kinchant. By this period the family owned a substantial proportion of Clive and Sansaw village as evidenced in John's will which names: "divers quarries of stone on Clive Hill...the sheep walk called Clive Hill....and New House Farm [Yorton].



Matters however now took an interesting turn as John Gardner died in 1801 without issue and his closest surviving relative proved to be a cousin – the Reverend Laurence Panting [1767-1844]- qualifying through his parents: Josina Gardner and Rev. Steven Panting of Wellington. An unusual condition of Laurence's inheritance of Sansaw Estate was that he change his name by Royal Licence to Gardner: "in manifestation of his affectionate grateful and respect" stipulation that perhaps came as a shock to his young wife, Martha Pemberton, whom he

had married only two years earlier. A Doctor of Divinity, his ministry was

most extensive as he continued to hold positions in several London parishes besides closer responsibilities in Lichfield, Birmingham and Condover. Despite these numerous commitments, he also served as Vicar of Clive [1810-1844] and was interred alongside his wife in the Clive Vault. Such an active religious career proves most helpful in revealing that this extensive estate of farmland and quarries was managed through a collection of tenant farmers, labourers and quarrymen whose livelihoods depended upon regular employment by their local Squire. Also evident was Laurence's pastoral concern for the education of his parishioners in his rental of Stone Grange from 1828 to 1841 for £4,4s. per annum.



Once more the problem of inheritance arose, due to a childless marriage and the death of his brothers, which resulted in Robert Panting [1804-1880] – eldest son of Thomas – taking over the Estate in 1844 once he too had agreed to the obligatory change of surname. A solicitor in the family's legal practice in Shrewsbury and later a Justice of the Peace, Robert had made a most judicial marriage [1828] to Jane Eliza Kynnersley, thus inheriting Leighton Hall where all seven of their children were born. Herein lay a major problem for Sansaw Estate and Clive

village, as initially they were forced to rely upon a non-resident landowner. The occasion of the Gardner family's eventual decision to reside at Sansaw in June 1860 was therefore "hailed as a matter of joy and felicitation by every class" with band-led processions, bell ringing and even canon fire accompanying a reception for local dignitaries at the Hall followed by a larger celebration for between 500 to 600 villagers on the Hill. The event was described in the local paper "as one of the pleasantest which has ever taken place at the Clive."

The euphoric nature of this reception did reflect a more practical sentiment as reflected in the welcoming speeches which hoped: "that this neighborhood will henceforth be permitted to profit by your residence in it." This expectation was soon realized two years later when Robert gifted land in Grinshill for the construction of a village school, and tellingly an act which

quite specifically targeted "a school for the education of children and adults; or children only of the laboring, manufacturing and other poorer classes of the Parish." A philanthropic and long-term concern for local villagers again became manifest in the early 1870s not only by donating an extensive section of his land, but additionally contributing £222.16s.61/2d to the funding of Clive School. His second son, Robert Junior, further served as Chairman of the School Committee.

The succession to the Estate by Robert's eldest son, Thomas Kynnersley Gardner in 1880, might have promised a continuation of this family's generous patronage, but these hopes were soon dashed due to Thomas having accrued substantial debts from 1868 onwards and even being cut out of his father's will. A lengthy courtroom battle of Dickensian proportions then ensued, although in the short-term Thomas pointedly returned to the original Kynnersley surname of his mother – this being his third change of name! Finally, the Sansaw Estate was sold in 1882 to James Jenkinson Bibby of Hardwicke Grange thus bringing to an end the sustained involvement of the Gardner family in the historic development of our village stretching from the reign of James 1 through until Queen Victoria's time.

THE STORY OF HALLOWE'EN AND HOW IT BEGAN

With Hallowe'en approaching we can expect to see plenty of pumpkins adorning the village. Pumpkins really took off in the UK during the 1990s and a conservative estimate says that 17 million were sold last year with a total value of almost £30m, great news for pumpkin growers!

However, I'm sure many of us remember when it was the humble turnip that lit up 31 October and, to my mind at least, I think they look far more gruesome.

I know that a lot of people bemoan the fact that turnips have been replaced by an American fashion but the irony is that these are in fact an Irish and Scottish invention.

These emigrants to the US took with them the tradition of Jack O' Lantern, a man who tried to outsmart the devil and was left wandering in the darkness, neither in heaven nor hell, with only a humble turnip to light his way.

Once they got there they were keen to continue their tradition but soon cottoned on to the fact that a pumpkin is a lot easier to carve than a turnip and so they adapted that as their choice of decoration.

Although it took a while, this new slant on Hallowe'en eventually came back to the UK making everyone's life a little easier.

Some of us are even lazier and have a ceramic pumpkin which can be reused every year and avoids cut fingers as well. Ours will be on display as usual this year and it's a good way of letting people know that it's OK to call for Trick or Treat.

Leaving pumpkins out after Hallowe'en or putting them in the woods is not recommended by wildlife organisations; apart from the fact that they could attract rats and other vermin, they can cause illness in animals such as hedgehogs and some birds and they may also have decorations, including candles, which will harm animals if eaten. However, chickens love them and so do pet rabbits (in small amounts) so if you

know someone who keeps either then you could offer yours.
